## Apply for the 2022 Vancouver Election Homebound Voting Pilot Program

100 spots available

Homebound voting allows Vancouver voters who cannot leave their home to vote. A team of two election officials visit your home and assist you with the voting process. Your vote will be up to you, and will be confidential.

### Who can apply for this program?

If you are eligible to vote in the Vancouver Election, you can apply for the homebound voting program if you cannot go to a voting place, vote by mail or vote independently due to a disability, illness, or other constraints.

Alternatively, please consider a voting opportunity below. There are only 100 spots available for this pilot program.

Apply to vote for the homebound voting program starting on Tuesday, September 6 at 10 am at [vancouver.ca/homebound-voting](https://vancouver.ca/homebound-voting) or call 3-1-1. Please have the following information ready:

1. Legal name
2. Residential address
3. Date of birth

### Alternative Voting Opportunities:

#### 1. Vote by mail.

This option will allow you to vote from home. To vote by mail, you must request a package from the Election Office starting on Tuesday, September 6. You will receive a vote by mail package, and you must return it to the City using the prepaid return envelope. Find out more at [vancouver.ca/vote](https://vancouver.ca/vote) or call 3-1-1.

#### 2. Vote by the curbside of a voting place on any of the advance voting days (October 1, 5, 8, 11, 13) or on Election Day (October 15).

When you arrive at a voting place, call 3-1-1. At that point, an election official will come outside to help you vote. Please visit [vancouver.ca/vote](https://vancouver.ca/vote) to check accessibility options and which voting places offer curbside voting.

#### 3. Use an assistive ballot-marking device on any of the advance voting days.

If you need help to mark your ballot and want to use a ballot marking device, please go to **Roundhouse Community Centre** (181 Roundhouse Mews) or **Trout Lake Community Centre** (3360 Victoria Drive). The device can help mark your ballot with:

- Sip-and-puff-, paddle- or other accessibility devices
- Audio instructions and braille markings on paddles and buttons
- Large print or high-colour contrast

#### 4. Bring someone you know to the voting place to help you, or get help from an election official on any of the advance voting days or on Election Day.

You can choose to:

- Get help from an assigned election official. All election workers take an oath to keep your vote a secret.
- Bring someone you know to the voting place. Let an election official know, as the person helping you will have to take an oath of secrecy.

If you need help in another language, you can be connected over the phone to more than 180 languages. American Sign Language is available on advance voting days.
